Should we call the New Earth Heaven?

N. T. Wright, Surprised by Hope, says no.

Heaven will be replaced by the New Earth.

"Heaven is not our Home."

"Heaven is important, but its not the end of the world."

What & Where is Heaven?

- 1. The Triune God's special, central dwelling place; where he lives with angels and his redeemed people.
- 2. The place where God's throne is; the location from which he rules the universe and carries out his sovereign plan.

Present Heaven & Future Heaven

- Two different *time frames* immediate (at death) v. eventual
- Two different conditions
 pre-resurrection/post-resurrection
- Two different *locations* one "up," likely outside our dimension, a *layover*; other our *final destination*
- Both are Heaven (original v. relocated)

God's future special dwelling place will be with his people on the New Earth:

- I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God...
- "the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them...and God himself will be with them...."

Revelation 21:2-3

 "the throne of God and of the Lamb" will be on the New Earth.

Revelation 22:1

The New Earth will be *God's central dwelling place* where he will live with his people and where his throne will be located.

If we understand it's 1) different from the *present* preresurrection Heaven, and 2) it will be a *fully embodied* existence on a *physical renovated Earth*, it's right to call the New Earth the *future* Heaven.

The New Earth is where we will forever have *life after life* after death.

. . . the mystery of his will, according to his purpose, which he set forth in Christ as a plan for the fullness of time, to unite all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth.

Ephesians 1:9-10

... through him to reconcile to himself *all* things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross.

Colossians 1:20

For by him [Jesus] *all things* were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible...all things were created by him and for him. He is before *all things*, and in him *all* **things** hold together... that in everything he might be preeminent. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell...to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross. Colossians 1:16-20

Christians often talk about living with God "in heaven" forever. But in fact the biblical teaching is richer than that: it tells us that there will be new heavens and a new earth—an entirely renewed creation—and we will live with God there. . . .

There will also be a new kind of unification of heaven and earth. . . . There will be a joining of heaven and earth in this new creation.

No time in Heaven?

Those who had been slain because of the word of God . . . called out in a loud voice, "How long, Sovereign Lord, holy and true, until you judge the inhabitants of the earth and avenge our blood?"

... Then each of them was given a white robe, and they were told to wait a little longer, until the number of their fellow servants and brothers who were to be killed as they had been was completed.

Revelation 6:9-11

... they are before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple.

Revelation 7:15

There was silence in heaven for about half an hour.

Revelation 8:1

On each side of the river stood the tree of life, bearing twelve crops of fruit, yielding its fruit every month.

Revelation 22:2

"There should be time no longer."

Revelation 10:6, KJV

There will be **no more delay!** (ESV, NIV, NLT)

Time will have run out: No time remaining before God judges.

"And time shall be no more" is not in the Bible!

Do we forget this life when we die and go to Heaven?

For we will all stand before God's judgment seat. . . . So then, each of us will give an account of ourselves to God.

Romans 14:10-12

How long before you will judge and avenge our blood on those ... on the earth?

Revelation 6:10

I will . . . remember their sins no more.

Jeremiah 31:34

He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away."

And he who was seated on the throne said, "Behold, I am making all things new."

Revelation 21:4-5

We will *live happily ever after!* We have *not* passed our peaks! We don't need a bucket list!

Is a Spiritual BODY non-physical?

Body is the **noun**, **spiritual** the **adjective** (as **Earth** is the **noun**, **New** the adjective).

Spiritual body can't be *non-physical* or it would be a *non-body*.

Christ's resurrection body was emphatically physical.

Interpretation: "Spiritual body" is a resurrected body under the control of a redeemed, cleansed and Christlike spirit.

They were startled and frightened and thought they saw a spirit. And [Jesus] said to them, "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? See my hands and my feet, that *it is I myself*.

Touch me, and see. For a spirit does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet.

Luke 24:37-40

All the dead shall be raised up, with the self-same bodies, and none other although with different qualities.

The Westminster Confession, 1646

The *self-same bodies* of the dead which were laid in the grave, being then again united to their souls forever, shall be raised up by the power of Christ.

> Westminster Larger Catechism, 1647

If Christ's "new body" meant a body that hadn't existed before, then...

his *old body* would have stayed in the tomb.

If Bob goes to Heaven when he dies, then **Bob must be the old Bob** made new.

Our bodies will be raised *only* if they *remain* our original bodies.

... the heavens will pass away with a roar, and the heavenly bodies will be burned up and dissolved, and the earth and the works that are done on it will be exposed.

heuresthisetai, works "found," laid bare, NIV; disclosed, HCSB "burned up," KJV, NASB

But according to his promise we are waiting for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells.

. . . Humankind, which has botched its original mandate and the whole creation along with it, is given another chance in Christ; we are reinstated as God's managers on earth. The original good creation is to be restored.

... to the resurrection of life ... to the resurrection of judgment.


John 5:28-29

There must be continuity, for otherwise there would be little point in speaking about a resurrection at all.

The calling into existence of a completely new set of people totally different from the present inhabitants of the earth would not be a resurrection.

- Resurrection: becoming embodied again after death; the same body made alive.
- Redemption: buying back what was formerly owned.
- Reconciliation: regaining a friend.

- Renewal: making new again, restoring to an original state.
- Regeneration: being born again, having a new beginning.
- Restoration: bringing back the lost.

No more Sea?

Fruit trees of all kinds will grow on **both banks of the**river. ... Every month they will bear fruit because the
water from the sanctuary flows to them. Their fruit will
serve for food and their leaves for healing.

Ezekiel 47:12

On each side of the river stood the tree of life, yielding its fruit every month. And the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations.

Revelation 22:2

This water flows . . . Into . . . the sea; when the water flows into the sea, the water will become fresh.

And wherever the river goes, every living creature that swarms will live, and there will be very many fish. . . that the waters of the sea may become fresh . . . everything will live where the river goes.

Ezekiel 47:8-9

Sea to Hebrews: treacherous, icy, stormy waters that separated families, destroyed ships, flooded lands, drowned loved ones.

Its creatures devoured seafarers, its *salt waters poisoned people* on the sea who craved fresh water.

Would safe, fresh, "sweet" life-giving ocean waters be "No more sea" as they knew it? (see Spurgeon)

What Discontinuity Centers On

He will wipe away every tear from their eyes; and there will **no longer** be **any** death; there will **no longer** be **any** mourning, or crying, or pain,

for the former things have passed away.

And he who was seated on the throne said, "Behold, I am making all things new."

Revelation 21:4-5

No longer will there be any curse.

Revelation 22:3

The believer's glorification

Discontinuity: we will be glorified

Continuity: we will be glorified

The Lord Jesus Christ... will **transform our lowly bodies** so that they will be like his glorious body.

Philippians 3:20-21

Glorified Jesus: Revelation 1:13-18; 19:11-16

And many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life... And those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the sky above: and those who turn many to right-eousness, like the stars forever and ever. Dan. 12:2-3

- ⁴¹ **The Son of Man** will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom *all* causes of sin and *all* law-breakers,
- ⁴² and **throw them into the fiery furnace**. In that place there will be **weeping** and **gnashing of teeth**.
- ⁴³ Then *the righteous will shine like the sun* in the kingdom of their Father.

MAJOR INTERPRETIVE PRINCIPLE

As the new person in Christ is to the old
And as the new body will be to the old
so the new heavens and new earth will be to
the old heavens and old earth.

Substantial *change*, essential *continuity*

New person New body New Earth

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come.

2 Corinthians 5:17

New creation is transformation of old; *same person changed*.

If there isn't continuity between old and new, there's no *re*generation, only generation.

Figurative or Literal?

Something *literal* can have great symbolic and figurative meaning.

* wedding ring, dress, cross, crown, sword, bread and wine, water baptism.

New Jerusalem can represent bride of Christ and still be a city. Walls can represent safety, gates access, river life, tree Eden, horses....

Some texts (e.g. Isaiah 65 & 66) use the term "New Earth" and therefore we should see them through that lens.

Some texts (e.g. Daniel 7) explicitly refer to an everlasting kingdom of God on earth.

Other prophetic texts are directly quoted in Revelation 21-22 and applied to the New Earth (e.g. Isaiah 60 and Ezekiel 47).

This suggests that other portions of the same passages likely also refer to the New Earth.

"New Earth" (e.g. Isaiah 65:17) should be interpreted as that—eternal kingdom of God on Earth—except when referring to things that we are elsewhere told will NOT be true of the New Earth, such as death (65:20).

Many things are likely true of **both** the Millennium **and** the New Earth, such as living in **houses**, planting **vineyards** and **animals** living at peace (Isaiah 65:21, 25).

If the Bible didn't speak of a future earth, then "rule the earth" and "inherit the earth" would be figurative.

If Scripture didn't teach resurrection bodies will be physical, and will eat and drink, then we should interpret feasting figuratively.

Jesus: Many will come from east and west and recline at table with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven.

Matthew 8:12

Jesus: I confer on you a kingdom . . . so that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom.

Luke 22:29-30

Will there be animals on the New Earth?

- Animals were the *second most important* aspect of God's earthly creation (Gen 2)
- God made a clear covenant not only with people but animals in Genesis 9...
- Animals are part of Romans 8's "all creation" that fell on our coattails, groans now and will rise on our coattails

- Animals are part of the earth's "all things" that will be renewed (Matthew 19:27-28) and restored (Acts 3:28)
- Isaiah 60 and Ezekiel 47's references to animals thriving in a renewed creation should be seen as about the New Earth
- Isaiah 65 is "New Earth" (v. 17) The wolf and the lamb will feed together... lion will eat straw like the ox... no more harm or destruction (v. 25)

Does already-fulfilled biblical prophecy argue for literal interpretation?

"Rejoice daughter of Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your king is coming to you; righteous and having salvation is he, humble and mounted on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey." Zechariah 9:9

Had we not been told Jesus fulfilled this literally, would we assume it's a figurative expression of messianic humility?

"Many will come from the east and the west, and will take their places at the feast with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven."

Matthew 8:11

Barring evidence to the contrary, there will be *real eating and drinking* in our resurrection bodies with identifiable historical people in the eternal kingdom.

"By [the lamb's] light will the nations walk, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory [splendors] into it"

Revelation 21:24

Barring evidence to the contrary, there will be nations, cultures and human rulers on the New Earth.

If figurative what would these symbolize?

Jesus: "use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourselves, so that when it is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings." Luke 16:9

Does other Scripture suggest we believe we will be embodied? And have dwellings in the eternal state? (Isaiah 65:21; John 14:1-2)

Conclusion: barring evidence to the contrary, Jesus suggests we'll have homes in the eternal state, and open them to others.

The tree of life was in the midst of the garden, and the LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and there he put the man whom he had formed.

... A river watering the garden flowed from Eden. . . . The LORD God put man in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.

Genesis 2:8-10, 15

The NATIONS will walk by [the Lamb's] light, and the KINGS OF THE EARTH will bring their splendor into [the city]. On no day will its gates ever be shut...

The glory and honor of the NATIONS will be brought into it. . . . the river of the water of life . . . flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb down the middle of the great street of the city. . . .

Revelation 21:24-26

... On each side of the river stood *the tree* of life, bearing twelve crops of fruit, yielding its fruit every month. And the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the NATIONS.

No longer will there be any curse. [God's] servants will *serve* him. They will see his face. . . . And they will *reign* for ever and ever. . . .

Revelation 22:2-5

- . . . Your gates shall be open continually; day and night they shall not be shut
- . . . that people may bring to you the wealth of the nations, with their kings led in procession.

Isaiah 60:11 (Revelation 21:24-26; 22:1-5) ... The teaching of the entire Scripture is to the effect that God's plans are never defeated, that he does not replace but restore.


If we'll be the *same people* with redeemed bodies and sinless natures living on a redeemed Earth, there's a *paradigm shift*:

Mountains? Rivers? Animals? Culture?

Concerts? Books? Science? Technology? Crafts? Sports? Space exploration?

The perspective moves from "No way" to "Why Not?" If it's sinful, obviously, NO. If human, image-bearing and God-honoring—and not

explicitly excluded, then **YES!**
