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
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

## Will there be rain and snow on the New Earth?

n the world to come, will we experience rainfall and snowfall? Some have never thought about it, because they don't think of Heaven as a real place or don't understand the doctrine of the New Earth, where we'll live as resurrected people. Or they assume the New Earth will have bright sunshine, no clouds, no rain, no snow... forever.

In a passage that promises rescue, security, and no more famine or fear for his people,



We'll see trees bearing fruit on the New Earth. Will they be rained on? Presumably. Will rain turn to snow in higher elevations? Why not? If there's snow, will people play in it, throw snowballs, sled down hillsides like we did as children? Of course. Just as resurrected people will still have eyes, ears, and feet, a resurrected Earth will have rain, snow, and wind. God made our desire to play.

Lightning, thunder, rain, and snow all declare God's greatness (Job 37:3-6). Is there any reason to conclude such things, invented by our God, will not be part of the New Earth? None. Of course, no one will die or be hurt by such weather.

When we live on the New Earth, could we go hiking in a snowstorm without fear of trauma or death? Must the New Earth be tamed, stripped of high peaks, deserts, waterfalls, and snowstorms because these sometimes caused pain and death in this world?

Surely nature, including variations in climate, will be a source of joy and pleasure, not destruction. If we stand amazed now at the wonders of God's great creation, we'll be even more amazed at the greater wonders of that greater and redeemed creation.



## Answered by Julia Stager, EPM staff

'm excited to hear your heart for serving God and the potential He's given you to reach people for Him. I think what you're asking can ultimately only be answered between you and the Lord. God calls different people to different things at different times and in different ways. I urge you to pray about how you can best represent Him in your life today.

If you ever feel like you're hiding who you are or are ashamed to be known as a Christian, that's a sign you're not serving God but serving yourself. As a general rule for myself I try to be more vocal with my faith than I'm naturally comfortable with-I don't shout on street corners, but I try to consistently represent Christ to those I'm around in a loving, unafraid, and unashamed way.

## Reaching the Forgotten and Abused, in Christ's Name

Gotta Go is a U.S. non-profit focused on spreading the Gospel through community development in Hunan, China by serving the impoverished, enslaved and those without a voice who have never before heard the name Jesus.

They do this through two main projects: The China Work Project (CWP) serves men and boys coming out of prison and migrants and mentally and/or physically challenged homeless coming off the streets; and Healing Hope (HH) serves women and girls who are trapped in sex slavery in brothels. They go where these men and women, boys and girls are—prisons, construction sites, train and bus stations, and brothels in this city of 7 million—to offer the Gospel, discipleship, counseling, medical care, housing, vocational training and employment.

Over 87% who come through CWP and HH choose to surrender their lives to Christ. As spiritual gifts and interests become apparent, the once forgotten and now redeemed slowly become the future leaders of the Hunan church.

## A Note from Randy Alcorn

Some of you may be aware that this past summer, EPM faced a serious financial shortfall for our third summer in a row. Of the six times in our 23-year history that we've had to publicly share our financial needs, three were in the last three years—despite our efforts to avoid this type of situation.

People generously came forward with small and large amounts, and we're grateful for each gift. Our finances have stabilized; God provided wonderfully and deserves the praise for all of this.

However, we're continuing to 1) carefully analyze expenditures 2) ask the Lord to provide for us over the long-haul, with sufficient finances that we'll be able to save money to sustain us through summertime when giving is historically at its lowest.

It is EPM's conviction never to beg for funds. However, we don't believe it's wrong to share a legitimate need, considering Paul's example: "For we do not want you to be ignorant, brothers, of the affliction we experienced" (2 Corinthians 1:8). After sharing about our financial status last June, one of the things we heard several times is, "We never knew you had any needs. Thank you for letting us know!"

If someone were to ask what EPM's greatest financial need is today, we would say it is new monthly supporters. This would stabilize us long-term, allowing cash flow to continue during the lean months. After your commitment to your local church, if and only if God so leads and you're willing to consider giving monthly—whatever size the amount—we'd be deeply appreciative. I want to also say a special thanks for the ongoing support of our current monthly donors. You are the backbone of this ministry. I am profoundly grateful for your kind support, in some cases for the past 23 years!

# EternityNoticel Stewardship and Giving

How we handle money and possessions demonstrates who we really believe is their true owner—God or us.



Were we honest, that's what many of us would say. Some believers ask each other tough questions: "Have you been spending time in the Word? Sharing your faith? Guarding your sexual purity?" Yet how often do we ask, "Are you winning the battle against materialism?" Or, "Have you been peeking at those tempting magazines and websites? You know, the ones that entice you to greed?"

People are more open even about their sexual struggles than about battling materialism, which may be the final frontier. Some churches do talk about getting out of debt. I applaud that. But you can be debt free and still be stingy

and greedy. We don't need to become smarter materialists; we need to repent of materialism and become smart stewards.

Jesus sees our hearts and knows us well. He doesn't call all disciples to give away everything. He does call us to take radical action that breaks our bondage to money and possessions, freeing us to live under

His lordship. He calls all of us to dethrone all secondary treasures in order to elevate Him as our primary treasure. If we value anything or anyone more than we value Jesus, we are not His disciples.

What we do with our money doesn't simply indicate where our heart is. According to Jesus, it determines where our heart goes. If our heart is where our treasure is (Matthew 6:19-21), then when we move our treasure somewhere else, our heart follows. This is a remarkable truth. If I want my heart somewhere I need to put my money there.

When people asked John the Baptist what they should do to bear the fruit of repentance, he told them to share their clothes and food with the poor. Then he instructed tax collectors not to collect and pocket extra money. Finally, he told soldiers not to extort money and accuse falsely, and to be content with their wages (Luke 3:7-14).

No one had asked John about money and possessions. Yet his answers showed that John couldn't talk about spiritual change without addressing how people handle material things.

If John the Baptist were to visit us today, what conclusions would he draw about our attitudes and actions toward money and possessions? Would the evidence convince him we are true followers of Jesus? Or would he see us as baptized versions of the world's self-preoccupied materialists?

Microsoft executive Tricia Mayer wrote me, "Stewardship is the Christian life. It is about what we do with every resource given to us, every day we walk the earth, and every relationship we have. The difficult task of stewardship is mustering the discipline and will

to manage the problem child called money."

A steward is entrusted with wealth or property that does not belong to him. It's his responsibility to manage that wealth in the best interests of, and according to the stated wishes of, the owner. God has given us life, time, talents, money, possessions, family, and His grace. In each case He evaluates what we do with what He's entrusted to us.

The steward is granted by the owner sufficient resources and the authority to carry out his designated responsibilities. When it comes to financial stewardship, God hasn't handed us a standardized checklist to mark off. Rather, He has provided us His Word with principles for effective financial stewardship—principles we have to wrestle with. A responsible steward consults the Owner, seeking His direction. This requires insight and wisdom far beyond our own. Scripture says, "If any of you lacks wisdom, he should ask God, who gives

> generously to all without finding fault" (James 1:5).

> Do you truly desire God's wisdom and empowerment in making difficult stewardship decisions (and evaluating your own heart)? Then ask. He won't leave you in the dark. He has given you His Word and His Spirit to guide you.

- And you shall remember the LORD your God, for it is He who gives you power to get wealth (Deut.
- The LORD makes poor and makes rich; He brings low and lifts up (1 Sam. 2:7).
- Both riches and honor come from You, and You reign over all (I Chron. 29:12).

Stewardship is living in the light of these truths. It's living with the awareness that we are managers, not owners, of what God has entrusted to us for this brief season. How we handle money and possessions demonstrates who we really believe is their true owner—God or us.

John Wesley offered four questions to help decide how to spend money. Notice how the last three flow directly out of the first one:


- In spending this money, am I acting as if I owned it, or am I acting as the Lord's trustee?
- What Scripture requires me to spend this money in this way?
- Can I offer up this purchase as a sacrifice to the Lord?
- Will God reward me for this expenditure at the resurrection of the just?

If we really believe God is the owner of everything, shouldn't we regularly be asking Him, "What do you want me to do with your money and your possessions?" And shouldn't we be open to the possibility that He may want us to share large portions of His assets with those whose needs are greater than ours?

I spoke with a man who'd read The Treasure Principle, my book on giving. He owns a profitable business and believes for the first time that he knows why God has

blessed him financially. It's not so he can drive nicer cars and live in a nicer house. It's to give it to build God's kingdom. I told him about several different missions groups and pro-life projects, and ways to help persecuted Christians. I wish you could have heard the excitement in his voice as he walked away determined to liquidate more earthly assets and dramatically expand his eternal investment portfolio!

This man followed through, and has given more and more over the years. He isn't reluctant and guilt-ridden. He's been liberated from material bondage, and is thrilled to have gotten onboard with what matters! He's like the man who

finds priceless treasure hidden in the field, "Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field" (Matt. 13:44). Do we pity the man for his sacrifices? No! We envy him both for his treasure and his joy.

If God is speaking to you, listen. Nothing's more fleeting than the moment of conviction. Never procrastinate obedience. Once we stand before His throne, it will be too late to go back and reclaim a lifetime of squandered opportunities. Gazing into the eyes of the Christ we treasure, we'll know exactly how we should have lived. God has given us His Word so we don't have to wait to die to find out. And He's given us His Spirit to empower us to live that way now.

## Letter from a Reader: The Joy of Giving

oney, Possessions, and Eternity and Heaven have had a very profound effect on my thinking—and my bank account—over the last year. We first downloaded the Kindle version of Money, Possessions, and Eternity. My husband began reading right away, but I wasn't interested. We've always been responsible with money, giving generously, and not in debt, so I didn't think I needed to read it.

But eventually I gave in and surprisingly found it interesting and challenging. In particular, your comments on Revelation 13:6 about the enemy seeking to steal our desire for Heaven caught my attention, so I began reading your book *Heaven* as well. Meditating on Heaven has given me a whole new perspective, making discontent circumstances seem so much smaller and insignificant. It also made me want to give a lot more—not because I felt guilty, but because I was excited about Heaven!

About the same time we were looking forward to my husband's yearly work bonus, and using it this year for muchneeded new kitchen counter tops. After reading your books though, my husband suggested that we give the entire bonus away to kingdom work, and I was totally on board with that idea. As we began to give, God began to release such joy!

Now one year later, I am convinced that there is absolutely nothing on this earth I could have bought myself with that money that would have given me half as much pleasure as I received from giving it all away. We helped friends with adoption costs, helped a missionary family come home for furlough, bought a used car for a young pastor at church, gave monthly support for Bible translation, and gave toward a large year-end need at our church.

The more we gave, the easier it was to give. We even designated part of the bonus money for each of our elementaryage children to choose how to give away, teaching them about stewardship and prayer in the process. We have been blessed by going to a new level of giving and in the future would like to continue stepping out in faith to give more.

Now it is bonus time again, and my counter cracks have turned into bigger chips. We have set up a small savings fund to replace the counters someday. It will take more time to get new kitchen counters this way, and our house won't get paid off as early as we'd planned, but I am happy to send my building materials ahead to eternity. Whenever I look at the chips in my counter, I am reminded of the children of prisoners that we sent to camp this summer, the Bibles we sent to persecuted countries, and those who will soon have God's Word in their own language through translation work we have helped with. What are counter tops compared to all of that? -A. K.




## The Noblest and Most Joy-Giving Sacrifice

## Beauty from Ashes

here we live we are able to burn our yard debris during certain times of the year. Each fall we clean up dead and dying plants and toss them into the burn pile, having deemed each plant as having served its purpose and its season having come to an end. When we do burn the pile, the fire burns extremely hot, and because of its size and intensity, it will often smolder for days. When it does eventually burn out, what remains is a large pile of ash.


This last spring a beautiful squash plant rose from the burn pile. Not a single person in our family planted it or tended it once it sprouted from the ashes. Yet this plant is the healthiest plant on the property. The seed survived the heat of the fire last fall and the freeze of winter, and the plant weathered the 80-degree, sunfilled days of this past summer. Not only did it survive all of those extreme elements, but it has also bore an abundance of fruit—there are over nine squash growing on this healthy plant!

The beauty of the abundant life rising from the ash pile has

captivated me. I have found my thoughts consumed with what God is saying through this plant that came to life from the ashes. It comforts me to know that God can bring beauty from ashes, and also reminds me that there is great potential for seeds buried in the soil of disappointment, sorrow, and despair.

Never underestimate the potential of a seed buried deep within the ashes. The fire that seemed to be relentless was in reality creating the perfect soil for new life.

## Resting in God's Hands, in All Seasons





owntown Portland is a busy place and full of needy people. On this particular day I had forgotten my bag of goodies which I normally give out to those asking for money, so I was street hopping to avoid contact with anyone.

I managed to weave my way through the early morning foot traffic but not so quickly that I wasn't seeing a very lost generation. My heart was burdened and I was reminded there is a place called Hell for those without God's gift of Jesus' sacrifice. I began to pray for certain souls on the streets. 
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
