The JESUS Film in Cambodia and Mexico

"For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous and his ears are attentive to their prayer" (1 Peter 3:12). I thought about this as I traveled this fall in East Asia, in a "closed" country which 26 years ago, when I was in college, I led a weekly prayer group concerning. What God has done in those years is miraculous.

and, no, this is not a typo—more than 650 daughter churches!

In October I also traveled to Cambodia with a team from the JESUS Film Project, including director Paul Eshleman, CEO of the ministry and Senior Vice-President of Campus Crusade for Christ International. It was thrilling to go to four places

in Phnom Penh where the film was being shown. (Twelve Cambodian film crews show the film every night in different locations some 60% of the country has now seen it.) We went down some muddy back alleys, where eighty people gathered in one location, two hundred in another, all of them

When logic would tell you the church would not be able to grow under government restrictions, it has grown at a phenomenal rate. I saw thriving churches, despite the fact that in some areas there is strong persecution. I worshipped at one church of 2500 people listening to biblical and Christcentered teaching. This church has planted—

watching the film attentively.

Every word in the film is from the gospel of Luke, and includes at the end an invitation to receive Christ. In countries with low literacy, people can't read the Bible even if it's been translated into their language; but all of them can understand the JESUS Film, which is Scripture on a screen,

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God made visible. It was thrilling to see the wondrous looks on people's faces especially those of the children—as they watched, and heard Jesus speak their own language.

While in Cambodia, I was asked to speak at an outreach dinner for VIPs. Guests included business executives, high-ranking government officials, ten medical doctors, university professors, a university president, television personalities and journalists, and four military generals.

God provided just the right interpreter, a Cambodian national who works with Campus Crusade. I sat down with him in a corner of the restaurant beforehand and went through what I was going to say, so he could think about the best words for the translation. We were right on the same wavelength. He knew by heart in Cambodian many of the Bible verses I'd be sharing.

Paul Eshleman introduced me as a writer. Knowing the importance of family to Cambodians, I told a story about my proud, independent father resisting Christ his whole life, then at age 84 putting a gun to his head and about to pull the trigger as I begged him not to, then by God's grace, finally coming to Christ as I prayed with him before he was wheeled into surgery.

I said I knew that as Cambodians they'd gone through immeasurable suffering. Pol Pot and the Khmer Rouge killed nearly three million people, reducing the population from eight million to five. Nearly everyone there could name anywhere from two to six or more murdered relatives. What we saw when we visited the Killing Fields—and one of the torture facilities—was as bad and worse than anything I've seen at the Holocaust memorials in Jerusalem and DC.

I said I knew they longed for peace and joy and hope. I told them about Jesus Christ, who understood suffering, who voluntarily suffered on our behalf, so we could be with him in heaven forever, the place for which we were made. Many Cambodians no longer have the illusion that this earth offers hope. I em-

phasized that the evil in the world—the evil they'd seen in the Killing Fields—came out of the evil in our hearts, and that's why Jesus died for us.

I stressed that He is not a God who is far away, but a God who is close, a God

who loves them and cares about them. This is in stark contrast to the remote cold gods of Buddhism that permeate the country. Jesus offers the peace and joy and hope that has seemed so impossible

in Cambodia. Governments and religions don't keep their promises, Jesus does. I ended by saying my hope was that they would give their lives to Christ that night and one day in heaven I would see them again. We would understand each other

without a translator, and I would introduce them to my dad.

After I presented the gospel, a Cambodian pastor, Vek Huong Taing, came up front. He and his wife Samoen and their child miraculously survived years in the Killing Fields, but that's another story. (EPM is now supporting this dear couple.) Vek gave the invitation to repent and receive Christ. One man was visibly crying at his table. We knew God was doing something special. But we didn't know the half of it.

As people filled out their response cards, some were indicating they'd prayed and accepted Christ as their Savior. After everyone was gone the organizers

counted the totals. I might have guessed ten converts, and I would have been thrilled at that. But out of 99 unbelievers, a total of 52 indicated they had put their faith in Christ!



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What About Follow-up?

- New believers, like children, need nurturing in their faith. The JESUS Film Project has developed follow-up strategies to help assure lasting results following film showings.
- Local churches in film showing areas are recruited in advance to help promote film showings and provide follow-up counselors.
- Follow-up counselors meet with those who come forward after the film to pray with them and write down their addresses for future visits.
- NewLife groups are formed to enfold and disciple new believers. Teaching elders from local churches lead the groups.
 - · NewLife groups are combined to plant new churches.
- NewLife training teams help prepare leadership for these new churches.
- Media Response Centers coordinate follow-up for television and radio presentations of the JESUS film—as well as answer responses from audio and videotape distribution.

I was amazed. (You know the old pattern—we pray, God answers, we're

shocked.) Each person is being followed up, channeled into churches, and numbers of them are being discipled together. This was all God's work—I and the others were just privileged to be there as his errand boys, serving Him and the dear Cambodian Christians who put this event together and bathed it in prayer. Those of you on our prayer support team added your prayers to theirs.

One powerful consequence of God's work at that outreach dinner emerged the next day. As we visited the Killing Fields Paul told us that, though 60% of Cambodians have seen the JESUS film, they have never been able to get permission to show the film in the region surrounding the Killing Fields. It turns out the deputy governor of that region had the letter of request sitting

on his desk for a long time and had refused to sign it. Well, guess who was at that VIP outreach—that same deputy governor. And...he prayed to accept Christ! The next morning he went to his office and signed that paper, giving permission to show the JESUS film in his region.

This was a dramatic example of the importance of reaching the upper classes of society—not because they are more valuable or more important to God (they

aren't), but because of the trickle-down benefits of the gospel it brings to the poor

and disadvantaged. As a result of that single man coming to Christ, tens of thousands of people will now see the JESUS film in their own language, and thousands of those will come to faith in Christ.

Psalm 66 kept coming to mind: "Shout with joy to God, all the earth! Sing the glory of his name; make his praise glorious! Say to God, 'How awesome are your deeds...Come and see what God has done, how awesome his works in man's behalf.""

Those who pray for or financially support EPM will one day meet in heaven some of these dear Cambodian brothers and sisters, and hear them say "thank you."

In November, just a month after returning from Cambodia, I spoke at a JESUS film donor conference in Mexico. Nanci and I went with a group to the outlying areas of Puerta Vallerto, away from the touristy stuff, and walked through the barrios passing out invitations to view the pelicula (film) under Los Mangos (the mango trees) at siete, repeating the word "gratis" (free) and our approximately seven other Spanish words, as if we knew what we were doing.

There's something amusing and endearing to people about Americans bumbling around trying to speak their language and doing a terrible job. On that basis, Nanci and I endeared ourselves to a lot of people. Of course, the local

> believers and JESUS film staff had no language barrier and the film was in Spanish.

> As the film showed, we watched and prayed. 270 people saw the film by the mangos, and when a JESUS film staffer gave a live invitation, 40 children and 25 adults raised their hands to say they had prayed to ask Jesus to forgive their sins and be their Savior and Lord. It was wonderful to see them come forward and be followed up by believers from local churches.

And it was exciting to be there praying. Not "just praying"—there's no such thing. One of the prayer issues related to problems with the film projector. You could sense the desperate efforts of evil spirits to derail this presentation of the gospel. What a privilege to par-

ticipate in spiritual warfare and the harvest of God's Spirit.

There were three other showings the same night. Over 200 people came to Christ. All are followed up by Campus Crusade/JESUS film staff and local church members and pastors. This is not only evangelism—discipleship and training and the local church are all taken very seriously. There were also daily full-page ads sharing the gospel in the major newspaper, and the JESUS audio drama was

played over the radio. This was the beginning of an intensive two-week saturation with the gospel.

The Mexico JESUS film director said something interesting-many American missions and southern churches make forays into northern Mexico to work on housing projects and bring the gospel, and this is great. (Our family and church have done the same.) But the deeper down you go into Mexico, the less evangelized the country is. People in large parts of Mexico have never heard the true gospel. They have a nominal Catholic affiliation,

but no true faith in Christ. Parts of Mexico are less evangelized than many parts of South America or Africa.

Seeing eyes glued and ears tuned to the JESUS film gives you a fresh appreciation of the gospel's magnificence. There is nothing like hearing people gasp and watching them cover their mouths and wipe their tears as they stand wideeyed, gaping at this Christ—this wonderful messenger sent from God-being nailed to the cross. It is a stunning sight, which I've now witnessed in three different cultures. I've also seen the people's joy and wonder and smiles when Christ appears after the resurrection, and watched as they absorb attentively the presentation of the gospel added to the end of the film, and the live presentation that often follows.

In restricted countries I've visited, the film can't be shown outdoors, but videos are watched on TVs. I'll never forget crowding into two homes in East Asia where the JESUS video was being shown by Christians to their neighbors. I counted 33 in one home and 37 in the other, eyes glued to the screen, listening in their own language to every word spoken by Jesus, straight from the Word of God.

The entire JESUS film can be watched over the internet (www.jesusfilm.org), and the second most popular language it's watched in is Arabic! Countless Muslims have watched it in the privacy of their own homes.

The JESUS film is arguably the single greatest evangelistic tool in history apart from the Word of God itself. It's now being used by more than 800 mission agencies worldwide, and has been shown in 223 countries.

Nearly three billion (that's not a typo either) people have seen the film, and over a hundred million of these have specifically indicated they have put their faith in Christ.

The film is in 560 languages, with new language translations being completed weekly. It's in Mandarin Chinese, spoken by 70% of China's 1.2 billion people. It's also in the language of the Nambikuara of northern Brazil, who number less that 500—the translation and recording were conducted by Wycliffe Bible Translators missionaries. Tens of thousands of churches have been planted around the world through the film.

I have seen the work and the workers first-hand in several countries, and I can vouch for the integrity, vision and biblical foundation of this ministry. I encourage you to read the accompanying information on the JESUS Film Project and consider if God would have you invest in eternity by getting involved in financial or prayer support for this wonderful work of the Lord.

Why I Give to the JESUS Film Project

The JESUS film possesses at least five qualities which may change your priorities for giving:

- 1. Fifty percent of the world's population is illiterate. The only way they can be reached with the gospel is for them to see it and hear it.
- 2. Fifty percent of the world's population is under the age of 18. Youth are very receptive to film as a medium for expressing ideas. This makes them especially receptive to the JESUS film.
- 3. Two to three billion people will never go to church unless they first see who Jesus is. The JESUS film will give them that one chance to see Jesus.
- 4. One-third of the world's population easily identifies with the times in which Jesus lived and taught.
- 5. The film assists in "picking the ripe fruit" through quickly identifying those who are ready.

Mission agencies and indigenous churches across the world are asking for the JESUS film. They will supply the workers to show the film over 100 times a year. They will train the church members to follow up the new converts to establish new churches—all they need is the film and equipment. We need to raise the money to equip them.

The harvest will not last forever. We must move where the Holy Spirit is moving before the doors of opportunity close.

JESUS Film Stories

Colombia, South America

In Colombia, South America, a missionary couple was driving along a rugged mountain road known for occasional attacks by bandits, when suddenly their car was blocked by thieves brandishing assault rifles, who ordered the couple to sit on the roadside while they ransacked the car.

The missionaries fearfully complied, wondering if they would be shot and killed, as often happens. The thieves took nearly everything, including the projector they were using to show the JESUS film in nearby villages. As the thieves began to leave, the husband boldly called, "Wait, you forgot to take the film." Amazingly, the bandits came back and snatched that, too.

A year later this same missionary was visiting inmates in prison. He was stunned to come across one of the roadway bandits, who immediately recognized him. The thief began to cry, then reached out and embraced him. With deep fervor he said, "I want you to know that after we robbed you, I watched the film and prayed to receive Christ. My life was radically changed, and I want to thank you. I am here in this place because now I am a Christian."

Breakthrough in Egypt

One of the amazing breakthroughs we continue to hear about is how the Lord is working supernaturally in the Muslim world to bring people to Himself. For example, Cairo, Egypt, the "Hollywood" of the Middle East, was the site of the second largest international book fair in the world in February of '97. Only three years ago, 1,000 Arabic videos of the JESUS film were sold at the fair. But in 1998, more than 35,000 videos were sold with a free New Testament included!

Anis Mansour, one of the most famous columnists in Egypt, wrote about the JESUS film on the back page of the *Ahram*, the most popular daily newspaper in the Arab world. He watched JESUS through two times, then wrote, "The story of humility, simplicity and mercy which conquered violence and suffering...and betrayal by his followers...it is a moving film."

On the last day of the Muslim fasting month of Ramadan, a Christian worker and his wife were driving along the deserted streets of Cairo just after the fast when everyone was home eating. They saw an old crippled man with a crutch waiting at a bus stop. Knowing that it would be an hour before the bus would come, the couple offered to give the man a ride. His clothes were tattered, and he was carrying a bag full of what seemed to be leftover pieces of meat and bones.

The couple drove the man as far as they could. As he got out of the car, they gave the man a New Testament. He thanked them and then asked, "Do you have the film?" Puzzled, the couple asked, "What film?" "The JESUS film," replied the man. When asked how he knew about the film, he responded, "My son bought it at the book fair. We've all watched it, and I'd like a copy."

This breakthrough in Egypt not only demonstrates the tremendous demand for the scriptures in non-traditional formats in Muslim countries, but it's evidence of the spiritual hunger in the souls of people like the crippled man mentioned above. This story is just one of the many examples of how God is moving today in the Middle East.

Headhunter Trusts Christ.

In the mountains of Southeast Asia, Hsam Yone, a local witch doctor, claimed to have 50 decapitated heads stashed in and around his bamboo hut. As a village leader, he had prestige among his people (because the more heads you have, the more status). When a JESUS film team bravely came to his area, the witch doctor resisted and refused to go to the showing. But, his 73-year-old mother went.

She heard the story of Christ, yet, did not respond. A few weeks later, she fell from a bamboo ladder and was paralyzed. On her bed, she remembered the film and called for the pastor from a nearby village who had been with the film team. Sitting by her bedside he told her, "Jesus can not only save you from your sin, but He can also heal your sickness." She believed, prayed to receive Christ, and was healed!

Still her son, the witch doctor, remained hard-of-heart, believing in "his spirits" and opposed to Christ. Able to walk



again, his mother attended a New Life Training Center where she learned that if she prayed for her son, the Holy Spirit would draw him to the Lord.

Meanwhile, Hasm—with his 50 heads nearby—was suddenly struck with the thought: "If someone were to cut off MY head, where will I spend eternity? I don't know!"

Immediately, he called for the same pastor who had led his mother to Christ. After talking for two hours, the witch doctor also trusted Christ and was baptized. With his "prestige" still intact, he gathered the entire village together—all 1,008 members. He told them what God had done for him. Each one prayed to receive Christ.

After two weeks of meetings with the pastor, the entire

group marched in line over narrow mountain trails to a stream where, one at a time, they were baptized!

In the last six months more than 100,000 Wa have seen the film in scores of villages. And now, the growing Wa church has set a goal of seeing 300,000 of their people come to Christ. To accomplish this, they want to send out a number of new JESUS film teams. Plus, they have a vision to cross over into China and share Christ with 500,000 more Wa!

Burma Buddhist Monks Accept Christ

The expense of gasoline for the generators is often a problem in Burma. (Named Myanmar by the military government in 1989, Burma is the name preferred by most of the people.) In one area, the team had only one gallon of gasoline—enough for one film showing. Only a few people gathered at first. Rumors had circulated that Christianity was for Westerners and not for Burmese people. Then, word spread that Jesus speaks Burmese. Local Buddhist monks provided gasoline for the generator. After insisting that the film team show the JESUS film three times in a row, 37 Buddhist monks prayed to receive Christ.

In another district in Myanmar, 42 villages turned to Christ after seeing the JESUS film. After the first showing, when an entire village stood to receive Christ, surprised team members asked why. Villagers explained that when witch doctors threw fire at the team members' backs, the fire turned to flowers. All of the villagers wanted to follow Christ since He is more powerful than the evil spirits they served. Forty-two pastors were subsequently trained—a pastor for each village.


A few months before I was born, my dad met a stranger who was new

to our small Tennessee town. From the beginning, Dad was fascinated with this enchanting newcomer and soon invited him to live with our family. The stranger was quickly accepted and was around to welcome me into the world a few months later.

As I grew up, I never questioned his place in our family. Mom taught me to love the Word of God. Dad taught me to obey it. But the stranger was our storyteller. He could weave the most fascinating tales. Adventures, mysteries and comedies were daily

conversations. He could hold our whole family spellbound for hours each evening.

He was like a friend to the whole family. He took Dad, Bill and me to our first major league baseball game. He was always encouraging us to see the movies, and he even made arrangements to introduce us to several movie stars. The stranger was an incessant talker. Dad didn't seem to mind but sometimes Mom would quietly get up—while the rest of us were enthralled with one of his stories of faraway places—and go to her room and read her Bible and pray. I



wonder now if she ever prayed that the stranger would leave. My Dad ruled our household with certain moral convictions. But this stranger never felt an obligation to honor them.

Profanity was not allowed in our house—not from us, our friends, or adults. Our longtime visitor, however, used occasional four-letter words that

burned my ears and made Dad squirm. To my knowledge, the stranger was never confronted. Dad didn't permit alcohol in his home. But the stranger enlightened us to other ways of life. He often offered us beer and other alcoholic

beverages. He made cigarettes look tasty, cigars manly, and pipes distinguished.

He talked freely about sex. His comments were sometimes blatant, sometimes suggestive, and generally embarrassing. I know now that my early concepts of the man/woman relationship were influenced by the stranger.

I believe it was only by the grace of God the stranger did not influence us even more. Time after time he opposed my parents' values. Yet he was seldom rebuked and never asked to leave.

More than thirty years have passed since the stranger moved in with the young family on Morningside Drive.

But if I were to walk into my parents' home today, I would still see him sitting over in a corner, waiting for someone to listen to him talk and watch him draw his pictures. His name? We always called him TV.

A Russian Christmas Story "For Always"

Will Fish

In 1994 two Americans answered an invitation from the Russian Department of Education to teach morals and ethics (based on biblical principles) in the public schools. They were invited to teach at prisons, businesses, the fire and police departments and a large orphanage. About 100 boys and girls who had been abandoned, abused, and left in the care of a government-run program were in the orphanage. They relate the following story in their own words:

It was nearing the holiday season, 1994, time for our orphans to hear for the first time the traditional story of Christmas. We told them about Mary and Joseph arriving in

Bethlehem. Finding no room in the inn, the couple went to a stable, where the baby Jesus was born and placed in a manger. Throughout the story, the children and orphanage staff sat in amazement as they listened. Some sat on the edges of their stools, trying to grasp every word.

Completing the story, we gave the children three small pieces of cardboard to make a crude manger. Each child was given a small paper square cut from yellow napkins I had brought with me. No colored paper was available in the city. Following instructions, the children tore the paper and carefully laid strips in the manger for straw. Small squares of flannel, cut from a wornout nightgown an Ameri-

can lady was throwing away as she left Russia, were used for the baby's blanket. A doll-like baby was cut from tan felt we had brought from the United States.

The orphans were busy assembling their manger as I walked among them to see if they needed any help. All went

well until I got to one table where little Misha sat—he looked to be about six years old and had finished his project. As I

looked at the little boy's manger, I was startled to see not one, but two babies in the manger.

Quickly I called for the translator to ask the lad why there were two babies in the manger.

Crossing his arms in front of him and looking at his completed manger scene, the child began to repeat the story very seriously. For such a young boy who had only heard the

Christmas story once, he related the happenings accurately—until he came to the part where Mary put the baby Jesus in the manger.

Then Misha started to ad lib. He made up his own ending to the story as he said, "And when Mary laid the baby in the

> manger, Jesus looked at me and asked me if I had a place to stay. I told him I have no mamma and I have no papa, so I don't have any place to stay. Then Jesus told me I could stay with him. But I told him I couldn't, because I didn't have a gift to give him like everybody else did. But I wanted to stay with Jesus so much so I thought maybe if I kept him warm that would be a good gift. So I asked Jesus, "If I keep you warm, will that be a good enough gift?" And Jesus told me, "If you keep me warm, that will be the best gift anybody ever gave me." So I got into the manger and then Jesus looked at me and told me I could stay with him-for always."

> As little Misha finished his story, his eyes brimmed

full of tears that splashed down his little cheeks. Putting his hand over his face, his head dropped to the table and his shoulders shook as he sobbed and sobbed. The little orphan had found someone who would never abandon nor abuse him, someone who would stay with him—for always.



Religious Bigotry Rising in America

(The following is a floor speech delivered by House Majority Leader Dick Armey, September 29, 1999)

Mr. Speaker, America today is at a crossroads. Our people head into the 21st Century having witnessed remarkable events all across the globe. We have seen the rise and fall of tyranny—Nazism and communism—with Americans being instrumental in the destruction of both. We have seen technological and scientific developments unparalleled in history. America itself is more prosperous than it has been at any time in its existence. The United States is now recognized as the unchallenged superpower in the world.

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But at the same time that our nation has seen so many achievements, we have to admit that there are some areas where we are not making the progress that we should. Tonight I regret to say that one area where we're losing ground is our treatment of religious believers. We are witnessing a rising level of bigotry against people of faith, especially Christians.

Mr. Speaker, let me tell you about some of the most recent examples that I've seen. The first three followed after the tragic shootings in Littleton, Colorado, and Fort Worth, Texas.

After the memorial service for the families and victims of Littleton, Colorado, the May 1st issue of the Denver Post editorialized against what it called the "disenfranchising" nature of this memorial service. According to the

editorial page writers, "While the service deftly satisfied the needs of fundamentalist Christians, it estranged too many others who came in search of healing" and due to the fact that the primary entertainment was by "Christian singers Amy Grant and Michael W. Smith, and the key speech was by the Rev. Franklin Graham, son of Billy Graham, it drove away a sizeable number of people who had come to mourn the deaths.

We urge state officials to learn from the error and plan future events to be inclusive, not divisive." In other words, the editors of the Denver Post objected to the families and victims turning to their faith in this terrible time of grief.

According to the May 18th edition of the *Washington Times*, plans to create a memorial for the family and victims of the Columbine shootings at the

Foothill Parks and Recreational District near the high school were scrapped after the "Freedom From Religion Foundation" threatened legal action.

The spokesman for the group said that the memorial would "make non-Christians feel unwelcome at

that park." The day after the tragic shooting

in Fort

Worth this month, the Washington Times reported that Attorney General Janet Reno was asked the next day whether she thought that the shootings had anything to do with hatred or religious bigotry. Janet Reno warned reporters that it was too early to characterize the Fort Worth shooting as a "hate crime." This reticence was in stark contrast to other cases of bigotry. For instance, last year the Justice Department offered its resources to help prosecutors prove racial bias in another Texas case involving the dragging death of James Byrd within days of the tragic killing. It's been two weeks since the shooting in Fort Worth, and we're still waiting.

Mr. Speaker, there are still other examples. Whether we wish to admit it

or not, Christians are now subject to ridicule, mistreatment, and bigotry—pure and simple.

The television show "Nothing Sacred" lived up to its billing by trying to develop storylines with ministers of the cloth engaging in immoral activity or finding ways to belittle people of faith altogether. According to the *New York Post* which ran in March of 1998, "Nothing Sacred" set an all-time low for viewership last year on a major network with 94% of the available market bypassing this program.

And Hollywood isn't any better. Movies such as this summer's release of "Stigmata" attack the Catholic Church, accusing it of being on a millennium-long crusade to stamp out the true teachings of Christ.

But, Mr. Speaker, there's more evidence that our society, rather than protecting freedom of religion, is discouraging religious expression.

According to the Associated Press, the ACLU sued the city of Republic, Missouri, on behalf of Jean Webb, a Wiccan witch, to have its city seal altered to remove the fish symbol. The May 6th article stated that the ACLU planned to also argue that since the "symbol is often found in Christian establishments, not non-Christian ones, and that most of the people who wrote letters supporting the fish identified it as a Christian symbol," the ACLU had plenty of evidence that the city's support of keeping the fish symbol constituted an establishment of religion.

The Chicago Tribune reported that the ACLU this year sued the Chicago Public Schools because of its activities with the Boy Scouts of America. Why? The April 26th news story indicated that it was because the Boy Scout oath pledges that a good scout will obey God. By the ACLU's reasoning, such an oath, because it mentions God, makes the Boy Scouts a religious organization which shouldn't be allowed on school property.

USA Today ran a story last week announcing that the Augusta, Kansas, school board has revoked a policy that allowed students to lead classmates in prayer over the school intercom after the American Civil Liberties Union challenged the policy as unconstitutional

On the May 21 broadcast of CNN's "Crossfire," Barry Lynn, the Executive Director of Americans United for the Separation of Church and State, went so far as to criticize the acclaim given to Cassie Bernall, the young girl who was shot at Columbine High because she wouldn't renounce her faith. He said, "I think that what we've done here is to take this one victim, turned it into an example of martyrdom, and then used to it become the springboard for

even more exploitation of this tragedy by people with a religious, political agenda." Such insensitivity would have been denounced if said about John F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, or even Rodney King.

The District of Columbia public school system was sued this summer for allowing a church to use an aban-


doned park as a parking lot in exchange for providing after-school services for neighborhood children. The September 17th story, as reported in the Washington Post, revealed that members of the Metropolitan Baptist Church have been parking about 300 cars on the field on Sundays for more than 10 years. Rev. Hicks agreed to cancel the contract rather than force the city to defend the suit. Rev. Hicks, pastor of the 5000 member Metropolitan Baptist Church of Washington, D.C., got my attention with his statement when announcing plans to terminate the contract, saying that "there has been a shift in culture." He said, "We've reached the point where God no longer has a place in our communities."

The Hagerstown Suns, a Single-A affiliate of the major-league Toronto Blue Jays, is being sued by the ACLU because they ran a promotion for the past six years that reduced ticket prices on Sundays for anybody coming to the stadium with a church bulletin. According to the *Baltimore Sun* in their June 29th edition, the ACLU believes this discount is a form of discrimination against the non-religious.

Jeff Jacoby complains in his August 19th column in the *Boston Globe* of a

blatant case of anti-religious bias involving an inner city Boston church. On July 15, the city of Boston sent a letter to Mason Cathedral, warning the church cen-

ter (which receives taxpayers' subsidies to help wayward youth) not to involve its teenage counselors in "religious activities including but not limited to the following: praying, reading Bible stories, drawing Bible pictures, and cleaning in the areas of the church where

Amazingly, our own federal Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention even funds a middle school curriculum "Healing the Hate" that suggests that among the warning signs for school counselors that a child may be dangerous is if he or she grows up in a "very religious" home. This is without one shred of evidence showing any linkage between Christians and any of these terrible acts of violence that our nation has faced. Imagine saying that a warning sign that a child may be dangerous or a threat to other classmates was the skin color or sexual orientation of that child's household.

In case after case, people of faith are told to mind their own business, keep to themselves, and stay out of the affairs of the rest of society. People of faith are called extremists, labeled out and out threats to our nation, and generally find "Not Welcome Here" signs all over the place.

Law-abiding people, who regularly attend church and try to live their lives as examples to their children and their community, are lampooned and mocked. Priests, ministers, and the laymen who support them are expected to sit at the back of the bus when it comes to par-

ticipating in the public square. As you've seen from my examples, when the rights of people of faith are trampled, newspapers and other leaders in our nation are either silent or complicit. Why is this? What about the rights of people of faith?

Bigotry of any kind should be confronted. It is always irrational and unjustified. Madmen who kill at a synagogue deserve our most

stinging disapprobation. The tragic death of James Byrd was worthy of national condemnation. But just as we should be eternally vigilant against racial bigotry, we must also protect the rights of people of faith.

People of faith are decent, loving and patriotic. They work hard to provide for their families and are tireless advocates for improving our communities across the nation. Let's join together and condemn those who would deny freedom and opportunity for every American. Let us have the simple common American decency to respect each and every person who feels within their heart the need to express their faith and respect of other people. We must deal with these circumstances honestly and assertively.

We are a great nation. We are a nation that has been declared in the past to be a good nation, a nation of good people. No matter what our prosperity, no matter what our power, we cannot be that if we cannot be a nation that has the decency to respect the faith of our citizens. We are failing in that regard, and we must turn it around.

I finished *Dominion* five minutes ago. This book gnawed at me as no other has ever done and I've read a lot of books.

I am a Caucasian female who grew up in South Carolina in the fifties and sixties. I remember always being puzzled by my parents' reference to a black family being "good niggers" as though there was some oddity in that statement.

I knew black people were treated differently. I just didn't know why. I remember the separate waiting rooms at my doctor's office. The door for the black people said "colored." I always wondered what color they meant. Our school became integrated when I was in the seventh grade. The year was 1966. The first black there was a boy named Jackie. He seemed nice enough, but I had little or no contact with him. By the time I graduated from high school, black students were a normal, significant portion of the student body. I don't think I even had any prejudice until I graduated from college and joined the workforce. There is where the undercurrent ran deep. There is where I bought into the "lazy black" philosophy.

I am grown now with grown children and a teenager at home. I know some wonderful black people, some wonderful Asian people, some wonderful Hispanic people. Some of them are friends, some only acquaintances, but I did not realize how deeply rooted and well-hidden my prejudices were until I began reading this book. I never thought about how being a minority might feel and why it's very difficult to "just get over it and move on."

The whole idea of racial healing has taken on new meaning for me, and I hope to bring this issue before our church board in the near future.

EPM Financial Information

From time to time people ask us "How is EPM doing financially?" We almost always say "fine." God has been faithful to provide all our needs in every way. Only one time in our history, a few years ago, have we sent out a letter making people aware of our financial needs. But the board has encouraged us to communicate more about our finances, so this is an update.

EPM is active in many ministries, and serves as a resource for everything from people with questions about eternity, heaven, missions or famine relief, to students wanting to make a prolife speech. Much of these contacts are spurred on by Randy's eleven books (with more in process) and our newsletter.

One of our reasons for existing is to help fund worthy organizations. We call to people's attention some of God's most strategic kingdom efforts. 100% of all contributions sent to EPM and designated to special ministries go there.

Some people like to centralize their giving and have chosen to do this through EPM. In a sense, they use us as eternal investment counselors and brokers. Then they write one check, with a note designating where they'd like the investment to go. Others will just designate "some worthy missions ministry" or "a strategic prolife project" or "to help the hungry." We then choose what we think is the best, or one of the very best, opportunities.

To do this effectively, we try to keep up with a number of different worthy ministries. If we become aware of problems that raise concerns about this ministry's effectiveness or integrity, we send our support elsewhere until this is resolved. (Occasionally someone sends us a contribution designated to an agency we don't feel we can support. In such cases we will return the contribution with a brief explanation.)

All of Randy Alcorn's book royalties are owned by EPM. As some of the books have been selling very well, this has been a greater source of income. It is Randy's desire (and the EPM board's) to use as much of this royalty income as possible

to fund worthy missions projects. For instance, in September we received a large royalty check and kept 10% for EPM and sent 90% to ten different ministries.

It may seem strange to do this when we could keep the funds and not need to rely as much on donors. *However, we believe the giving and prayers of people are vital to what we're doing.* We also believe God's hand is on the book sales and he is pleased when we dedicate those to Him and give them to his work.

Partly because of our central emphasis on special giving to other ministries, rather than to EPM's general fund, our monthly support sometimes falls considerably short of our needs, even though we labor to keep expenditures at a minimum. God provides in the form of periodic gifts from some of you, but these are not nearly enough to offset our expenses.

While Ron Norquist has moved to part-time (since becoming a part-time schoolteacher), we have just added a part-time bookkeeper and financial secretary, Janet Albers, and a webmaster Rick Rizzo. They join Kathy Norquist (Randy's Ministry Assistant) and Bonnie Hiestand (secretary). Nanci Alcorn is working less at EPM than in the past, but still is a part-time employee. As our financial reports testify, the salaries we pay are not high.

Randy is our only full-time employee, but with every new book and newsletter and speaking opportunity and phone call and email and visit to the website, the ministry continues to expand. We find ourselves in contact with more and more people each month. We're joyfully laboring to keep up. We rejoice that God is at work in this ministry.

If God does lay on your heart to give to our ministry, or to pray for us (the greatest gift you can give), know that we deeply appreciate it. (We do encourage you to give the firstfruits of your income to the Bible-teaching Christ-centered church where you fellowship.) Exploiting the Generation Gap CosmoGirl vs. Parents

Imagine if strangers approached your 12-year-old daughter and said they wanted to talk with her about her problems at home, at school and with boys. You'd probably be pretty upset. After all, who has the right to give your daughter advice—especially on what's going on at home? Shouldn't she be talking to you?

Not according to a hot new magazine called CosmoGirl! The way the editors see it, parents are preachy and out of touch with what teenage girls need to hear. And CosmoGirl! aims to fill that void. It's the latest example of how advertisers are marketing over the heads of parents directly to

kids.

CosmoGirl! is the brainchild of the Hearst publishing empire which publishes Cosmopolitan magazine. Cosmo, of course, played a big role in launching the sexual revolution back in the sixties. Now they're poised to bring the sexual revolution to your daughter—and they're not asking your permission.

In creating a *Cosmo* for kids, Hearst is capitalizing on a lucrative trend in magazines aimed at teens. It's loaded with horoscopes, celebrity gossip and love guidance. It even has a sex advice column from Dr. Ruth and another column that tells girls how to get their own way when their parents disapprove of their plans.

The CosmoGirl! web site gives an idea of what Hearst has in mind for our daughters: "We can help you with questions about your changing body that you feel funny about asking your doctor or mom," it says. "Are you nervous about the pressures that boys may be putting on you? Are your parents totally stressing you out? You can look to CosmoGirl! for realistic advice."

The web site boasts that CosmoGirl! is edited by "someone who's young enough to understand...and can tell you the real deal—without being preachy like a mom."

This trend to reach over parents' heads and appeal directly to kids has become pronounced over the last 30 years. Before then, parents were recognized as the arbiters of what messages their kids were getting—and of what they purchased. But today's teens have plenty of

money of their own—and that's why companies market directly to them without much concern about whether or not parents approve of either the messages or the products.

And what is *CosmoGirl!'s* message? That kids can't trust their parents. After all, if they trusted their parents they probably wouldn't be buying magazines like *CosmoGirl!* And that would be bad for business. So companies have a huge stake in keeping children divided from—and at odds with—their parents. It's a cynical ploy and one Christians must stand against.

Our best defense is to take an active interest in our children's lives. If we don't, they'll find it all too easy to turn to magazines like *CosmoGirl!* for advice. Remember, kids turn elsewhere for advice only if they don't get satisfactory answers at home. If you create a world that is loving and honest you can neutralize the lure of magazines like *CosmoGirl!*

All children—yes, even teenage girls—long for an honest, open relationship with their parents. And no matter what the media tells you, that's worth far more than a whole truckload of makeup tips, celebrity gossip—and unbiblical advice.

Oregon Patiet W ith Dementia Given Suicide: Decision Falls Upon HMO Administrator

The psychiatrist who evaluated her declared Kate Cheney, an 85-year-old woman with growing dementia, ineligible for assisted suicide. This declaration was made because of her cognitive impairments and because her family appeared to be pressuring her, according to an October 17, 1999, Oregonian article by Erin Hoover Barnett (*Is Mom Capable of Choosing to Die?* p. G1-2). She could not remember recent events and people, including the names of her hospice nurses or her new doctor. This doctor had been assigned to Mrs. Cheney when her disgruntled daughter demanded a different physician for her mother, after her original doctor appeared less than enthusiastic about assisted suicide for her.

When the psychiatrist said she was not eligible for assisted suicide, the daughter and the new doctor did not accept the opinion as the safeguard it was supposed to be. Instead, they sought another opinion from a second mental health professional since there is nothing in the Oregon law to stop them from doing so.

The psychologist admitted the patient could not even remember when she was diagnosed with terminal cancer, although it had only been a few months ago. She also wrote that the patient's "choices may be influenced by her family's wishes and

her daughter, Erika, may be somewhat coercive" (p. G2). Nevertheless, she approved the suicide.


The final call came down to a single Kaiser administrator, Dr. Robert Richardson. He gave the go-ahead for giving a lethal overdose to this elderly woman under pressure from her family. It was his call.

Kaiser Permanente is a fully capitated HMO with a profit sharing plan for its doctors.

As predicted, it can be seen that once assisted suicide is legalized there is no way to protect the vulnerable and mentally ill.
